



A Funding Scan For Age-Friendly Initiatives In New Hampshire: An Overview Of Key Opportunities With A Special Segment on Covid-19 Funds.

October 2020 Update

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Through a group of diverse stakeholders invested in aging issues across the state, New Hampshire actively seeks to redefine aging and promote the development of age-friendly communities. Established in 2016, the New Hampshire Alliance for Healthy Aging (NHAHA) focuses on the health and wellbeing of older people in the state. Utilizing a collective impact framework, NHAHA works to promote a shared vision to create communities in New Hampshire that advance culture, policies, and services which support older people and their families. NHAHA is currently focused on five strategic priority areas: 1) Improving the workforce availability for quality healthcare and social services; 2) Enhancing support for family caregivers; 3) Increasing transportation options; 4) Advancing zoning changes to promote affordable and accessible housing options; and 5) Developing an advocacy infrastructure. To achieve success across these areas, innovative strategies for funding must be pursued. This report is intended to provide information on funding opportunities that could support communities, coalitions, and NHAHA in creating age-friendly communities. This report focuses on, but is not limited to, funding opportunities that best correlate with the 2020 NH AHA strategic priority areas. By providing information on various funding streams to stakeholders across the state, NHAHA hopes to increase access to funds that can be used to build on the growing collective energy towards making lasting change for all of us as we age.

Covid-19 and the Evolving Landscape of Funding Opportunities

The Covid-19 pandemic has led to unprecedented times forcing organizations and communities to operate in a constantly evolving atmosphere. Many funders recognize the strain placed on organizations because of the pandemic and have responded with flexibility in their funding opportunities and grant making procedures. For example, funders have changed their application or reporting requirements, updated their priorities to focus on Covid-19, expanded opportunities to allow more funding for organizations most impacted by Covid-19, and/or offered grant extensions to current grantees. Additionally, due to the impact of the pandemic on their financial resources, some funders have ceased providing grants for the remainder of 2020. To capture these changes, a special segment has been added to this year's 2020 Funding Scan that lists Covid-19 Relief Funding opportunities alphabetically (starting on page 43). While this list is not exhaustive it serves as a starting point for organizations looking for funding opportunities and changes related to Covid-19.

Methodology and Data Collection

Researchers began by investigating grant makers with which they are familiar (e.g., NH Charitable Foundation, Administration on Community Living, etc.). Other grant makers and opportunities were found using UNH SPIN- SMART funding opportunity database, Google searches, information in subject-specific newsletters and literature, and word of mouth. While every effort was made to identify grant opportunities, this list is not exhaustive, nor does it itemize the specific obligations of every opportunity. Using the Funding Scan

The scan is updated on an annual basis by researchers at the Center on Aging and Community Living at the University of New Hampshire and is currently in its fourth edition. Annual updates consist of a review of the current funding landscape to update listed opportunities, adding new opportunities, and removing opportunities that are no longer applicable. This scan includes information on grants from both private and public sectors, with each opportunity listed alphabetically. Many of the opportunities pertain to numerous strategies and are not categorized so as not to bias or limit broadminded possibilities. Opportunities have been potentially mapped with NHAHA strategy areas utilizing icons (see chart below). Within each funding opportunity, the organization’s website, a brief summary of the aims and goals of the organization, the level of the opportunity, type of opportunity, funding amount or range of amount, timing, and icons that relate to specific strategy areas are provided. As a caveat, funders can change their priorities at any time, and it is recommended that website links be used to confirm all information.

Arch Community Fund

Summary: The Arch Community Fund was launched in 2017 and seeks to strengthen grassroots movements to resist oppression and build towards a more equitable future. Arch Community Fund focuses on organizing efforts that center on resistance of injustice, community leadership, dismantling systems of oppression, and addressing intersectional analysis of structural racism. Arch Community Fund does not prioritize specific issues in its grantmaking, but rather seeks to fund community-led organizing that is visionary, intersectional, and focused on building power.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Grant amounts range between \$15,000 – \$25,000.

Timing: Applications are typically offered in the fall and due in December.

Summary: AARP Foundation focuses on supporting and advancing effective solutions to help vulnerable older adults transform their lives and secure essentials for their future. AARP Foundation focuses on collaborating with grantee and partner organizations to identify sustainable evidence-based interventions to address fundamental challenges facing low-income older adults. AARP Foundation helps grantees bring proven new approaches to scale in local communities. Additionally, AARP Foundation is a grantee of the Social Innovation Fund, a program of the Corporation for National and Community Service, a federal agency for volunteering and service programs. AARP Foundation also offers community challenge grants to

fund quick-action projects that can help communities become more livable for people of all ages. AARP Foundation releases requests for proposals that are announced on an ongoing basis. This source should be checked frequently for new funding opportunities.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service, research, and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Not stated.

Timing: Dependent on stipulations of request for proposal.

Administration for Community Living

Summary: The Administration for Community Living (ACL) is a federal agency housed within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Each year, Congress appropriates funds to be used by ACL to increase access to community supports, while focusing attention and resources on the unique needs of older Americans and people with disabilities across the lifespan. Grants and cooperative agreements are then created by ACL to appropriate funding to states through funding opportunity announcements. Some grants are awarded in accordance with formulas established in legislation, while others are awarded in a competitive process. This source should be checked frequently for new funding opportunities.

Level of Opportunity: Statewide and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service, research, and capacity building (related to specific ACL priorities and federally legislated mandates).

Funding Amount: Varies depending on priority.

Timing: Visit website and sign up for funding alerts to be notified of opportunities.

Summary: The Alzheimer's Foundation of America seeks to provide optimal care and support services to individuals living with Alzheimer's Disease and dementia, and their caregivers. The

Alzheimer's Foundation of America offers grants, details can be found below. To qualify for these grants, the applicant must be an Alzheimer's Foundation organization member.

- **The Milton and Phyllis Berg Family Respite Care Grant:** The Alzheimer's Foundation of America awards grants to help provide respite care scholarships to families in need.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service.

Funding Amount: Each award is \$6,000.

Timing: Applications are accepted in spring (deadline is typically in April) and fall (deadline is typically in November).

- **Bi-Annual Membership Grant:** The Alzheimer's Foundation of America awards grants to help further the mission of delivering support, services, and education to individuals living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, and to their families and caregivers.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service.

Funding Amount: Each award is \$6,000.

Timing: Applications are offered in winter (deadline is typically in February) and fall (deadline is typically in August).

NHAHA Strategic Framework Area:



- **Anne and Irving Brodsky Innovation Grant:** Alzheimer's Foundation of America provides funding to one-member organization per year for an innovative program that improves the lives of individuals with Alzheimer's disease or other related illnesses, and their families. The program must demonstrate creativity and uniqueness, greatest need, and replication potential.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and research.

Funding Amount: \$25,000.

Timing: Application deadline is typically in September.

- **Project Lifesaver International Grant:** Exclusively offered to Project Lifesaver International members, Alzheimer’s Foundation of America’s new grant program supports wandering prevention programs and other public safety initiatives designed to protect individuals living with dementia-related illnesses such as Alzheimer’s disease.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service.

Funding Amount: Each grant award is \$6,000.

Timing: Offered in the spring (deadline is typically in July) and fall (deadline is typically in November) each year.

Summary: The Anthem Foundation supports initiatives that target specific, preventable health concerns and the social determinants that can impact them. There are five emphasis areas:

- *Healthy Hearts:* Supports programs that minimize controllable cardiovascular diseases and strokes including efforts to reduce smoking, obesity, high blood pressure and stressful and inactive lifestyles.
- *Cancer Prevention:* Supports organizations that implement lifesaving cancer-prevention and early-detection programs.
- *Healthy Diabetes Prevention:* Invests in programs that reduce the spread of diabetes through healthy lifestyle changes and increased physical activity.
- *Healthy Active Lifestyle:* Supports programs that raise awareness for, educate on, and encourage new behaviors, resulting in healthy, active lifestyles that offer long-term benefits.
- *Mental Health:* Supports programs designed to increase access to resources for behavioral health conditions and provide education about the importance of whole-person health.

The Anthem Foundation includes two funding options. While the Anthem Foundation does fund research and policy programs, these grants are awarded by invitation only. For more information on these programs contact Anthem Foundation at anthem.foundation@anthem.com.

- **Community Relations and Sponsorships:** The Anthem Foundation supports fundraising events and smaller-scale programs that align with the mission and priorities listed above.

Funding Amount: Varies depending on proposal.

Timing: Applications are accepted throughout the year.

- **Program Grants:** The Anthem Foundation supports ongoing community health programs with proven and measurable outcomes.

Level of Opportunity: Community and statewide impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service.

Funding Amount: Varies depending on proposal.

Timing: Applications are accepted throughout the year. Timeline of review is determined by factors such as request scope, prioritization of need, and alignment of corporate responsibility strategy.

Summary: The Bank of America has a clear purpose to help make financial lives better through a strategy of responsible growth, with focus on environmental, social, and governance leadership.

- **Economic mobility focused on the needs of individuals and families:** Bank of America Charitable Foundation invests in workforce development, basic needs, and access to meaningful employment for people in poverty by collaborating with nonprofits. Priority is given to projects that address critical basic needs (i.e., hunger relief, services for the homeless, and family stabilization and crisis prevention), and creating a more diverse and inclusive workforce (e.g., alternative pathways for meaningful employment for adults, removing barriers to employment, etc.)

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Not stated.

Timing: Typical application period is February.

- **Economic mobility focused on community needs by addressing economic development and social progress:** Bank of America Charitable Foundation invests in affordable housing, community revitalization, and arts and the environment through local, national, and global nonprofit organizations. Priority is given to projects that address building vibrant communities and expanding access to housing opportunities, specifically connecting low- and moderate-income individuals and families with the tools and resources to achieve their financial goals.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Not stated.

Timing: Typical application period is June.

Summary: The Norwin and Elizabeth Bean Foundation supports projects in the fields of arts and humanities, education, environment, health, human services, and public/society benefit aiming to help the communities of Manchester and Amherst, New Hampshire. Funded projects must have a defined, significant problem or opportunity in their field, a well-planned approach to addressing the issue, and skilled professional and voluntary leadership.

Priority consideration organizations will:

- Extend services to individuals and groups that are not well provided for through current programs
- Develop service capacity that can be sustained in the future because it will attract other funding and/or generate revenue
- Promote cooperation and resource sharing among community organizations
- Improve the financial stability and managerial capacity of established organizations
- Help service agencies in Manchester and Amherst better prepare for the future and help them effectively meet emerging community needs
- Are there models with value for replication, or that provide new approaches that have been successful?

Geographic Preference: Amherst and Manchester, NH

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Not explicitly stated.

Timing: Applications are typically due in December, April, and September.

Summary: The Brookdale Foundation Group consists of Brookdale Foundation, Glendale Foundation, and Ramapo Trust. The Group Respite Care Program offers seed grants to organizations to develop and implement community-based, social model day programs that provide dementia-specific group activities for older adults and respite for family caregivers.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service.

Funding Amount: Grants of \$10,000 are awarded for year one, which is renewable for \$5,000 for the second year, based on the evaluation of first year's activities and continuity of program.

Timing: The Brookdale Foundation grants have been removed for 2020 due to the uncertainty caused by the Covid-19 pandemic. Applications are typically due in July.

Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation Center

Summary: The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and administers many federal programs across the nation. Specifically, CMS houses the Innovation Center, which seeks to test innovative payment and service delivery models to reduce program expenditures while preserving quality of care. The Innovation Center provides funding to test models within categories; some include accountable care, primary care transformation, and initiatives, focused on Medicare-Medicaid enrollees. Grants are announced on an ongoing basis, and this source should be checked often.

Level of Opportunity: Statewide and national impact, depending on category of interest.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and research.

Funding Amount: Not stated; depends on category of model in which applicant is interested in.

Timing: Visit website for grant availability.

Summary: To address the social challenges communities face, Citizens Bank created the Champions in Action program, a unique grant opportunity designed to reward nonprofit organizations in communities across the nation. The Champions in Action program announces two topics each year that seek to improve social issues across the nation. The 2021 topics include: Covid-19 Relief and Social Equity and Inclusion.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service, research, and capacity building.

Funding: Up to \$35,000

Timing: Typically, application process is during February and August.

Summary: Claremont Savings Bank Foundation funds a wide range of charitable initiatives to enhance the quality of life and economic vitality in communities that they serve. Grants requests are encouraged from civic, arts, social service, health, affordable housing, and minority organizations. In the past, Claremont Savings Bank Foundation has funded the Charlestown Senior Citizens Club, Transportation Services – Community Alliance of Human Services, Inc., Friends of Veterans, Springfield Meals and Wheels, United Valley Interfaith Project, and Claremont Senior Center. Priority is given to Sullivan County.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Grants typically range from \$500 to \$5,000.

Timing: Applications are typically due in August.

Summary: The Clowes Fund encourages organizations and projects that help to build a just and equitable society; create opportunities for initiative; foster creativity and the growth of knowledge; and promote appreciation of the natural environment. The Clowes Fund supports organizations and programs that focus primarily on socioeconomically disadvantaged individuals across three programmatic areas: arts, education, and social services. In New Hampshire, priority consideration is given to social service requests serving Grafton, Sullivan, and Cheshire counties. Further, priority is given to organizations supporting efforts to address the economic, linguistic, legal, and mental and emotional hurdles that foreign born individuals and their children face during integration in the U.S. society and economy.

Level of Opportunity: Community impact.

Type of Opportunity: Capacity building, research, and direct service.

Funding Amount: First-time grants are generally within the Clowes Fund's small grant range (up to \$20,000) for a single year. For renewal grants, Clowes Fund offers awards of up to \$50,000.

Timing: Due to Covid-19, only current and recent Clowes Fund grantees will be considered for funding in 2021. Typically, preliminary proposals are due in November, and final proposals are due in February .

Summary: The Commonwealth Fund is a private foundation that aims to promote a high performing healthcare system that achieves better access, improved quality, and greater efficiency, particularly for society's most vulnerable. The Commonwealth Fund supports independent research on healthcare issues and making grants to improve healthcare practice and policy. The Commonwealth Fund has many focal areas, three are pertinent to this report and are detailed below:

- **Advancing Medicare:** The Commonwealth Fund seeks to identify ways in which the Medicare program can serve its beneficiaries more effectively and efficiently while promoting improvement throughout the healthcare system. More specifically, Commonwealth supports research that examines how Medicare can improve access to the benefits and care; assess and disseminate innovations for improving value in and across the health system; examine the Medicare Advantage program of private health plans to determine how to better meet beneficiaries' needs, lower costs, and improve health outcomes; and improve coordination between Medicare and other public programs.
- **Healthcare Delivery System Reform:** The Commonwealth Fund seeks to improve care for two groups: individuals with high healthcare needs and people with low income. Specifically, the Commonwealth Fund seeks to support efforts that build an evidence base to better understand the needs of these two populations and to demonstrate the value of improving care; identify and assess promising models, programs, and practices; and promote payment reform and policy improvements to facilitate delivery system reform.
- **Vulnerable Populations:** The Commonwealth Fund seeks to improve access, quality-of-care, and health outcomes of those who are subject to social injustices related to race, ethnicity, poverty, gender, sexual orientation, age, first language, or physical or mental health condition. Improvement considerations require comprehensive approaches that address physical health, behavioral health, and social needs.

Level of Opportunity: National impact.

Type of Opportunity: Research and direct service.

Funding Amount: Not stated, however, both board-approval grants (above \$50,000) and small grants (under \$50,000) are available.

Timing: Letters of inquiry are accepted on a rolling basis.

Summary: The Sarah K. DeCoizart Perpetual Charitable Trust supports a range of projects in blindness and vision impairments. Service-related grants may include expansion of existing services, implementation of new efforts, and improvements of infrastructure to facilitate services. Research grants are primarily considered through disease association or other intermediaries with re-granting programs guided by scientific advisory committees. Preference will be given to efforts that support emerging research talent, innovative treatment, or early detection studies.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service and research.

Funding Amount: Grants range in size from \$20,000 to \$75,000 per year. Multi-year requests are considered.

Timing: The application deadline is typically in October.

Summary: The United States Department of Labor (DOL) aims to foster, promote, and develop the welfare of wage earners, job seekers, and retirees of the United States; improve working conditions; advance opportunities for profitable employment; and assure work-related benefits

and rights. Within DOL, many different agencies provide funding opportunities. Specifically, the Employment and Training Administration (ETA) administers federal government job training and worker dislocation programs; federal grants to states for public employment service programs; and unemployment insurance benefits. These services are primarily provided through state and local workforce development systems. Grants are announced on an ongoing basis, and this source should be checked frequently for new funding opportunities.

Level of Opportunity: Statewide and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service, research, and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Varies depending on announcement.

Timing: Visit website to look at grant availability.

Geographic Limitations: Grants are only accepted in the areas of Derry, Londonderry, Windham, Chester, Hampstead, and Sandown, New Hampshire.



Summary: Endowment for Health seeks to improve and reduce the burden of illness for the people of New Hampshire – especially the vulnerable and underserved – and prioritizes advancing healthy aging for all. Utilizing strategic grants, they focus on building a healthy aging coalition; increasing the knowledge base; growing leadership and community support; and increasing funding and support for policy. Endowment for Health also offers opportunity grants that aim to meet the needs outside the scope of the Endowment’s priority areas. Opportunity grants provide funding for urgent needs, innovative projects, and projects that build and disseminate knowledge to improve the health of New Hampshire’s people.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Research and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Opportunity Grants range from \$1,000 to \$20,000. Other grant amounts are not stated.

Summary: The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) provides grants to local public transit systems, including buses, subways, light and commuter rails, trolleys, and ferries. FTA provides annual formula grants to transit agencies nationwide as well as discretionary funding in

competitive processes. This source should be checked frequently for new funding opportunities as new grants are announced on an ongoing basis.

Level of Opportunity: Community, statewide, and national impact.

Type of Opportunity: Direct service, research, and capacity building.

Funding Amount: Varies depending on announcement.


